Play Format Descriptions

Open Play Definition for Pickleball Courts

Open Play refers to a system where pickleball courts are available to all players on a first-come, first-served basis. Here are the specifics for how open play operates per court:

1. First-Come, First-Served:

• Players or groups of players use the courts in the order they arrive. There are no reservations or sign-ups required in advance.

2. Game Duration:

- When players are waiting, games are limited to one game up to 11 points.
- A 2-minute warm-up period is allowed before the game starts.

3. Waiting Players:

• Players waiting to play should wait outside the fenced perimeter at their preferred court (numbered 1 to 7).

4. Doubles Encouraged:

• To maximize court usage and allow more players to participate, doubles play is encouraged.

5. Rotation:

- Once a game is finished, the players who were waiting the longest on the outside
 of the fenced perimeter by the chosen court take their turn on the court.
- The players who just finished their game move to the waiting area if they wish to play again.

Paddle System Definition for Pickleball Courts

Paddle System refers to a method of managing court usage that helps organize the order in which players get to play. Here are the specifics for how the paddle system operates per court:

1. Paddle Placement:

• Players place their paddles in a designated area to form a queue for all courts. The paddles are stacked in the order they arrive.

2. Game Rotation:

• When a court becomes available, the next four paddles in line are used to form the next group of players. Typically, this means the first four paddles in the queue play the next game.

3. Game Duration:

- Games are typically played to 11 points, win by 2. When the game ends, the next group of players (as determined by the next four paddles in line) takes the court.
- A 2-minute warm-up period is allowed before the game starts.

4. Returning to the Oueue:

 After finishing a game, players place their paddles back in the queue if they wish to play again. The paddles are placed at the end of the line to ensure everyone gets a fair turn.

5. Managing the Queue:

• All players are expected to respect the paddle queue and wait their turn. The system ensures an organized and fair rotation of players on the courts.

6. **Doubles Encouraged:**

 Doubles play is encouraged to maximize court usage and allow more players to participate.

7. Inclusive Play:

• The paddle system is designed to accommodate players of all levels, from beginners to advanced. This ensures that everyone has an opportunity to play and improve their skills.

Challenge Court Definition for Pickleball Courts

Challenge Court refers to a system where players can challenge the winners of the current game to take the court. Here are the specifics for how the challenge court operates:

1. Challenge Queue:

• Players or teams place their paddles in a designated challenge area to indicate they are next to challenge the winners.

2. Game Duration:

• Games are typically played to 11 points, win by 2. The winning team stays on the court to play against the next challengers.

3. Challenging the Winners:

• The next challengers take the court once the current game ends. The winners stay on the court until they are defeated or reach the win limit.

4. Win Limit:

• The winning person or team can stay on the court for up to **3 consecutive wins**. After reaching this limit, they must step off the court and place their paddles back in the challenge area if they wish to play again.

5. Rotation:

 Players who have played a game must place their paddles back in the challenge area if they wish to challenge again. This ensures that everyone has an opportunity to challenge and play.





1. We need one challenge court and then we need to Que or line up stacking paddles in one place not for each court. Each court lining up paddles is a disaster and causes fights. Need shade snd a bench.

- 2. This way its continuous play instead of waiting for one court and the court with no paddles waiting could stay on all day. Even say a goup of 5 stacked extra paddles in rack so the group could stay on
- 3. It works the best.
- 4. Open play with more organization. Need a sign up sheet with the time each group started at so the people waiting can take the place of who has been playing the longest instead of choosing a random court and potentially kicking someone off who just started.
- 5. Waiting times is less can stack multiple paddles in line for all courts all paddles in one line only .works well at Worthy
- 6. Less likely hood of players cheating and monopolizing courts by placing additional paddles in racks
- 7. This system works better
- 8. It only makes sense because any other way means that it is not inclusive to everyone, The open play where you have to search for places to put your paddles. I hate the fact that people don't even have to walk off the court before they can stick their paddles back in there while people are walking up to put their paddles in. I waited 25 minutes the other day to play because if I would've switched, I wasn't sure how much longer I was going to have to wait. it was a ridiculous waste of my time. Also, if you go in as a single player, people do not want to let you on the court if you have only one paddle in that silly holder. If you want to keep the holders, line them up all on one side of the entire area. It's so silly having a walk around and search and call out to people every five seconds asking them what their score is so you know where to put your paddle... it's ridiculous.
- 9. It allows players to play with other that are their level or challenge better players.
- 10. The paddle holder system in place is not fair to all players. Unless you are being a hawk on the court where you placed your paddle people will cheat by changing the score when no one is listening. Plus if you pick the wrong court to place your paddle other courts may finish sooner but you still have to wait. Paddles down, in a queue, makes it simple, equal and fair for all. Challenge courts should not be allowed. All the courts should be available to every level of player.
- 11. The queue system speeds up play for all players. When there is an open court the next four players waiting get to go on. Otherwise, if you are putting your paddles on a particular court (like the present system), the game before you may take a very long time, but other courts finish sooner. So it is like picking the wrong line at the bank. There should be a single line/queue for the first court available. Everybody gets to play more.
- 12. This opens up available courts much faster
- 13. I like open play. Paddles need to be placed in a queue when you get to the courts. I think there should only be one line for all 6 courts and whichever one opens up first you go to that court like at worthy. I do like the idea of one challenge court. The team who wins on the challenge court should only get to play two games and then rotate off. There can be a separate paddle queue for the one challenge court.
- 14. This system worked very well in the past and assured fair rotation of all the courts. Some people are taking advantage of the current system and "hogging" a court for a long period of time.
- 15. It is the fairest system and the hardest to cheat or pass over other players waiting.
- 16. There should be 1 challenge court, 2 MAX.
- 17. It is a more fair system and ensures everyone rotates.
- 18. Due to the layout at Edison it could be hard to use one paddle system for all courts. People will be interrupting too many games getting to their court. Perhaps use one system for the larger area of 5 courts and use this side with three courts for challenge court and paddles by the other two courts. You could also designate the lower 5 courts to beginning and intermediate and the top three courts for advanced and challenge. In Tustin it's 2 games not one, so 4 on, 4 off and only 1 game is also too many people moving awoke too often. If you go with 2 on, 2 off which is what I've seen in most places around s the USA you'll have more people Intermixing which is more The pickleball culture. For those wanting g to play with their own fireside, that's snobbish and Tennis etiquette is more friendly.
- 19. Makes it more fair
- 20. I'm often a single player and this system gives me more opportunity to play and feel included. Prior to the current method, I met way more people and everyone enjoyed chatting together while we waited. Everyone seemed happy. Since the current change, too many people are angry and complaining. I no longer feel comfortable going unless I can find a partner to play with because the current system doesn't make it easy for a single player to easily fit in.
- 21. Faster turnovers! More plays

- 22. It works, why change it
- 23. Please use the system that is in place at Worthy Park. First come, first served per court. Too many people with stay on a court and not rotate out. I've seen groups of 6-8 set up umbrellas, coolers, chairs and monopolize a court for the entire day. This takes an entire court (or more) out of service depending on how many families do this. It should be four off and four on like Worthy Park.
- 24. 4 on 4 off for the next available court.
- 25. I've played on courts with and without a paddle system and I think it, by far, works the best and is the most equitable
- 26. No reservations can play with people more your level
- 27. Games go faster
- 28. Almost every xourt in OC uses this system and it is fair for everyone.

- 30. I do not like the Challenge court idea as it's not conducive for beginners or less experienced players to learn and get playing time. First Come first serve doesn't make sense unless you have a group of 4 ready to go on the court. What if you are the only player or just 2 players waiting at a specific court?
- 31. This is the only one that makes sense.

- 33. This seems like the fairest way of playing on crowded courts. It also has an easy solution to prevent disputes as to who is next.

- 36. I choose paddle system because this way you don't have to keep going court to court.
- 37. Paddle System (because it seems to currently work), or Open Play seem like fine formats. Challenge court becomes rough, because the best players are usually the roughest players (not everyone wants to play with them), and turns aren't really taken if the best players only keep playing.
- 38. It has worked well at Worthy park.

- 40. A combination of designated courts for open play as well as challenge courts which allows for twosomes to challenge the winners ,making for competitive play. I like the idea that the challenge court winners are limited to three consecutive games as well. Perhaps have two designated challenge courts and five courts for open play.
- 41. To serve all players at all levels and give them the opportunity to play with players of a equal level
- 42. Expecting players to give up the court after 1 game is absurd and certainly not happening. Guessing which court will open first is equally absurd. There should be ONE paddle queue for the whole place. When a court opens, the next paddle is up. This is first come first served. Once you and your group get a court, you can play as long as you want. Nothing in your descriptions is actually happening because it is ridiculous.

- 44. Having to choose a court to wait for does not work. You have no idea how long people have been there. Or some are even doing classes. Best is ONE queue for next available court
- 45. A beginner would have a hard time enjoying a game against an advanced champion. This is supposed to be fun for all and not add stress to our relaxation time.
- 46. As a beginner, I dont think challenge system sounds good at all. As a shy and insecure person, I dont want to play with strangers so the paddle system sounds good at all either.
- 47. All players, regardless of ability level, should be able to rotate more often rather than the best players playing 3 games in a row.
- 48. So you can play with who you want to play with and level of player doesn't matter.


- 49. I can see potential for problems with both the Open Play and Paddle System, if dealing with a person who thought the rules were for everyone but him.

- 62. I like the idea of having one challenge court. The 4 on 4 off format is how most city's do it. Paddles system for all courts and one challenge court! The paddle saddle should be in one area and potentially colored to know what color (4 players) goes next.
- 63. Paddle system reflects the majority of players who come as a foursome & want to play each other. Offering Challenger court on 2 of the courts fosters community building by putting players who may not know each other on the same court. Great way to meet people!
- 64. There is a group of 8-10 people who HOG courts 6 & 7 and totally ignore court etiquette and courtesy. There were several screaming incidents as they wouldn't vacate the 2 courts and simply rotated/continued to play amongst themselves, despite the number of people waiting in one queue. Very rude and disrespectful, unsportsmanlike behavior. Only the Open Play format put pressure on them to relinquish the 2 courts. If they followed court etiquette, then I would vote for the Paddle system.
- 65. Open Play for most of the courts and reserve one court for challenge Court like most places
- 66. Open play but have 1 designated court for challenge.
- 67. I think this is most equitable. If everyone plays by rules and rotates out after one game', that seems fair.
- 68. Paddle System is easy and clear. It is the most fair and faster to get on the next available court. First come/next on. Can be a single, double stack, triple, or four stack. Only 1 line up area on the ground easy to set down, stack and move forward. Those holders don't allow stacking. So many problems with "preferred court" It was working just fine at Edison. These holders are a nightmare! One can have one paddle in it for 45 minutes while others at court keep playing!! And the signs! Too many signs from the city!! Just come out and ask the players using these courts. You have created so much confusion and controversy and more command frustration. Keep Edison and Worthy Free and easy and clear. Paddles down. Can stack in any combo. First come/ next play. Advanced challenge players can and do play at other places like Los Cab. Please go back to the way it was.
- 69. Queuing paddles in one line is preferred as of current paddle holders have been placed near each court and this causes many disputes and frustration. One challenge court may be good
- 70. Divide courts by one beginner, two intermediate and one advanced Do not allow singles if there are paddles queued. Explain and allow 'skipping' if there is a group of four that wants to play.

- 72. Moat equitable
- 73. There should be one queue for courts 1 3 and another queue for courts 4–7. That way the next people in line that have been waiting the longest get on the first available court
- 74. Two community paddle cues: One for courts 1-3 and one for courts 4-7. The separate bins for each court ruin the social aspect and make it difficult to know where to place your paddles, ie which game is closer to completion. Optional: Have one challenge court on both sides. Maybe split the two cues by skill levels.
- 75. Yes, this is not rocket science it's really simple. We put our paddles down and the first available court that is open. We can take it.
- 76. Keep it simple, the paddle system works perfectly everywhere else I play. The current system just causes chaos.

- 83. Paddle system is the most efficient of the styles I've seen. I've noticed that the line moves quickly and the system keeps people from hogging a court and also from people jumping the line.
- 84. Old system was best
- 85. All paddle systems need to be on one side of the court not spread out all around! Too hard to navigate based on when the score is at and order of play.
- 86. Paddle system needs to be ONE cue not spread out . This was the original system and it was PERFECT
- 87. i liked the old lineup with all the paddles on the ground in a single line
- 88. Paddle system for 5 courts. Reserve 1 court for advanced challenge court, and 1 court for beginner's challenge court. If that is too complicated, then I vote for paddle system for 6 courts and 1 challenge court.
- 89. Fair & equitable system BUT Paddle placement should be limited to ONE side & with RULES to prevent conflict
- 90. this gives everyone a fair chance to play. It forces everyone to play different players and helps you meet new friends
- 91. I thought the original system with paddles on the ground gave a better mix of play and was more fairly balanced. What we have now is chaotic as the paddle holders are too spread out and there is no organic mix of play which is a big part of the pickleball community.
- 92. It's the fair way to do it and ensures the quickest method of getting on a court. It's similar to a bank you wait in a single line and when you're at the front of the line you go to the next available teller.
- 93. If there are limited courts and they are always full then the paddle system allows for for a better "everyone plays" rather that really good players dominating the court time. If there are enough courts then a few could be designated "Challenge" that way the best players can play the best where paddle system is completely random on who you will play and could be a complete mismatch of skill levels.

- 94. This ensures consistent rotation of players into games. If a group of players want to play together rather than where their paddle is in the queue then they need to defer until the group paddles are in line on the queues for a court.
- 95. The way the paddle holders are placed now, it is too hard for people to tell exactly what it is They are waiting for, and only The holders on courts closest to the fence are used because you can't see the others, or people don't want to walk over to the individual court to place paddle.
- 96. Paddle system but one or two courts reserved for challenge play
- 97. The court layout does not work well for the paddle system. Folks will be walking through games and there are too many courts to keep track of. The current system should work if folks let it. Problems come from the old school people who played here when there were just a few temporary courts and they've decided it should be the paddle system creating tension. (This is the way it's always been mentality) The current system works fine as long as folks adhere to the system/occasionally you get some entitled folks who hog the court. Most times and days it's not a problem. Weekends and some holiday mornings are the busiest. My opinion is stay with the system you have, and people will figure it out.



- 2. Paddles placed in a queue and as courts come available players play.
- 3. I agree because it gives people freedom to play without added stress but need to have a sign up sheet with times groups started so people in queue can take the place of groups that have been playing the longest instead of randomly picking a court to wait at

- 4. One line for all paddles like worthy
- 5. Get rid of the paddle holders. First come first served on all courts
- 6. Because it is inclusive to everyone, and if people only have an hour or an hour and a half to play, they will still be able to get on a court more than like twice. There was absolutely nothing wrong with the rules that we had before, and I know at Worthy, they threw that whole new system right out the door in an instant, and it was easier for them to do so because, everybody lined up on one side.
- 7. bad idea to have a line at each court. Paddle should be placed in a queue, and when court comes available, the next set of four players play.
- 8. Above
- 9. I've seen "cheating" with the current rules with groups "reserving" their court by keeping extra paddles in the rack, thus preventing others from putting paddles in. Their group of friends never come off the court as others are waiting, they may stay on the court for over 90 minutes. I've seen it and complained to them. I have witness a few arguments over the use of the courts, exactly counter to the social aspect of pickleball. Also the current system prevents a single player or couples from finding a court to play.
- 10. These current rules give a large group the opportunity to hoard more courts. That do not share with the other players. They bring their chairs and sit inside the courts! Playing for hours!
- 11. Current system does not foster a sense of community. People stack paddles so nobody else can join in the play. If. 2 people are waiting ant the current 4 people finish and leave they have nobody to play with. Continuous flow for everybody is guaranteed through the queue system
- 12. It is easily taken advantage of by some people to stay on a court for a long period of time.
- 13. Allows people to stay on after their turn is up if people are waiting in the wrong queue.
- 14. There should be only on line to wait for the players for ALL COURTS! When a game is over the next four go to THAT court. DONT pick a specific court to play on as they are all the same and that's when the problem starts. People don't want to leave the court their playing on so when asked their score they lie and stay that they "JUST STARTED"! That's why there should be just one line for ALL COURTS!!!!
- 15. It is hard to follow and it seems like many people don't follow those rules and just stay on a court.
- 16. 2 on, 2 off. That way you get two games, and each with different players. Thats the pickleball spirit. Also, rank your courts. Lower 5 beginning in intermediate. Upper 3 advanced and o e challenge court.
- 17. I want to be able to be able to play as a single player because my schedule is busy and I can't always pre-plan with another player. I don't like waiting outside the fence. I want to socialize with everyone while waiting to play. And I like the rotation of playing with various people. When groups shown up and keep playing together then single people like myself end up leaving because it's not an inclusive setting.
- 18. Takes too long to play multiple games
- 19. I like the paddle system. Get off the court if there are four paddles.
- 20. Same as I explained earlier.
- 21. The last bullet point does not align with the Paddle System option which does not utilize a "preferred court".
- 22. Not waiting outside a specific court. One paddle que for all courts with exception of 2 challenge courts one for expert and one for intermediate level.
- 23. It's too confusing to pick a cord and then it ends up maybe one game goes longer than next and you're waiting longer in 1 court than if you would just happen to pick another court. Court system works if games are timed and that can't happen

- 25. Takes to long to find a court. Especially since groups of players hog the court or lie on the score!
- 26. A group of players can effectively hold 1 or 2 courts for long periods.
- 27. Doesn't seem fair to all players.
- 28. As mentioned above, waiting at a specific court doesn't make sense. What if the current game is super long whereas a different court or courts become available sooner?

- 29. Rules must be followed or thing get out of hand, I do hope the better rules I'm voting for will be put in place.
- 30. You shouldn't have to wait for a specific court. There should just be a queue for the next available court
- 31. Too much time going around to find a court. Also, having to ask players what the score is so we know how much time is left.
- 32. Although people fight over there because they cannot agree on "where the line starts" (on the North or East side of the courts...groan).
- 33. You have to wait for a specific court and sometimes have to wait longer than others
- 34. Having the paddle holders at each numbered court, you don't know which court to put your paddle at because you don't know who's gonna be done with the game. So you wait 25 minutes or you're running around asking everybody what the score is and if you don't have your paddle in the paddle holder. Then they start playing another game or they yell at you for coming on the court!
- 35. My experience has been the waiting area is set up by the east two entrances rather than waiting for a specific court, it's the next court that becomes available at the end of a game. I have found for the most part people are cognizant of what open play means and respect the General premise, when your game is over, the next foursome waiting takes the court
- 36. We have 7 courts. In a perfect world I would like to have two challenge courts. One beginner court. Three intermediate courts. And one advanced court
- 37. this is not followed
- 38. Same response as above.
- 39. Playing one game to 11 is not enough. Especially if you've been waiting 20 min to get on the court. Maybe do 1 hr. Plus sometimes we go to practice or no game so that rule wouldn't apply.
- 40. I think it should be a time limit, not a game limit. As a beginner, we sometimes just want to volley and practice, not play a real game. Additionally, especially when players have un matched skills, a game could be very quick, or conversly, last an eternity if players are very evenly matched.
- 41. This is a city park. No one should be able to play multiple games if others are waiting.
- 42. Seems fair to all.

- 44. Not everyone is able to play doubles. It's not fair that I can't play because I come alone. I don't like waiting outside the gate. Sometimes I get ignored and the players on the court start a new game like they didn't notice me standing there.

- 46. Paddles should be gathered in one area instead of one for each court. Some games take longer than others and people can come up after people have been waiting and get to play because they were lucky to pick a court that was further along in their game.
- 47. Easy to get to know people when they are at court waiting

- 49. It would be nice to not have to pick a specific court to wait at.
- 50. It's very confusing and people are not playing fair. Placing multiple of there own paddles in the saddle to hold the next game. Large groups monopolize courts not letting others join. It's to hard to see what's going on in each court. It also separates everyone. We should be here enjoying eachother instead we are spread out trying to figure out who will let us join. The current system is exclusive and NOT inclusive.
- 51. This is standard protocol at clubs and others public courts.
- 52. Other cities have the same Open Play system. I personally prefer the Paddle System but given that there is a group of people who disregard the queue and court etiquette, I see no equitable way to enforce nor police the Paddle system. There is too much drama. If the Edison Park manager is willing to be the "court enforcer/monitor" of the Paddle System, I am more than happy to line up in a single queue for the next available court.
- 53. the current rule is uniformly observed by most public courts, because it's fair and allows everyone a chance and choice to play on their preferred courts. One designated challenge court would satisfy the urge of more advanced players who prefer more challenging competitions.

- 54. When we have played at edison, I was never told the court rules or seen people leave after 1 game. Must I play doubles? My wife and I are just learning
- 55. Your new preferred court system does not work!we have to walk around all three sides watch listen to find out the scores which game will be done next. Can wait 20-30 minutes for one court while the other 6 can play another game! Some so frustrated leave and go home. It's so bad. Needs to be first come next play.
- 56. It should not be the preferred court to wait for. It should be the next available court the next four in the Que play.
- 57. But this is not being implemented due to paddles being placed near each court please change immediately also allow for stacking in the que
- 58. current rules didn't explain paddle stacking.
- 59. Fair and well organized
- 60. If there is no preference for players, that seems not right. It should be when a court is open and it's their turn, they can play. If they have a preference to a court, players can allow others waiting to go ahead of them, as they wait for their desired court.

- 62. Some games can take longer. If you pick a court where they stay on, you have a longer wait, even if you were there before other courts finish.
- 63. There should be one queue for courts 1 3 and another queue for courts 4–7. That way the next people in line that have been waiting the longest get on the first available court

- 65. It's confusing and not efficient. It also discourages individuals to show up and get a game. It's much less communal.
- 66. Every rule is fine except the last rule
- 67. I think it's fine, but if the paddle system is recognized nationwide we should go with that. I'm 50/50
- 68. However, one game up to 11 points goes quickly.... then you have to get back in line. Maybe it should be 2 games up to 11 points.
- 69. Depending on price it would be nice to rent but for me personally this would only be needed if I were to rent all courts like for a church youth activity or large family or work event. But I think it should be reasonably priced. Otherwise I prefer to rotate in for free.
- 70. The Paddle system makes more sense. It's truer to the "first come first served" model. For example, on the Open Play system you may be the first person waiting for a certain court, but that particular game may run long. So you could be waiting longer to play than someone who came later, who happened to wait for a court with a faster game. Best just to have people wait in the same queue, and whoever's in front goes to the next open court. Challenge Court is an inefficient use of the space that lets more skilled players dominate court-time. Maybe there are other players who welcome the challenge, and if so maybe reserve a court for that play style. Otherwise it's a waste of court time for other players.

The current system does not factor in the fact that each game varies speed so someone arrive first might be waiting for 15 minutes at a court, while another group might arrive much later but luckily picked a court that has a fast game. Also, waiting at each court makes it hard to see if there are paddles waiting because the perimeter of the courts are so far apart. It makes it difficult to have a pickup game for single players looking for a partner. It also does not promote community through lack of interaction with people since we have to wait so far apart from each other.

That way we're only feeding off of two paddle holders for each side. For one for each side. This way we're not running around and trying to figure out to where to put our paddles on. And not asking or interrupting someone's ongoing game. This would be similar to the old way of just putting your paddles on the ground in a line. Which worked great for everybody. We were very happy with the old way and do not like these new paddle holders.

My recommendation is to keep Edison available at no rental program.
