I am a resident and voter in Huntington Beach. I have lived (and voted) here since 1970.

I am writing you to urge you to give the voters of Huntington Beach a voice in deciding whether it is in the interest of Huntington Beach to transfer/outsource management of our public library to a private for-profit corporation.

It is my understanding that a charter amendment measure and an advisory vote/ cessation of Request for Proposals action (Agenda Item 24-350) have been placed on the agenda for the next City Council meeting on May 7, 2024. Those measures would give the voters of Huntington Beach a voice on this issue. I urge you to support those measures.

Personally, I strongly oppose efforts to transfer the management of Huntington Beach's libraries away from local control. I find it ironic that a council majority (and the City Attorney) who normally couch their actions in local-control language now seek to transfer management of our Huntington Beach libraries away from local control to control by a for-profit corporation located far from our city.

This is personal for me. I have spent countless hours in the Huntington Beach Central Library. I've read books there, graded student papers there, researched and written my master's thesis there, volunteered in the literacy program there, and on and on. This is my library. My connection to this library is personal.

The Huntington Beach Public Library is the city's most beloved (and used) resource. It operates efficiently and economically. Our librarians and staff are respected and beloved by the community. I would remind you that it is your obligation to the citizens of this city to protect the library rather than to weaken it.

I would like to comment on two agenda items.

First, I urge approval of 24-337. I agree that non-commercial signs should be prohibited in our public rights-of-way. This would stop the competitive rush for wall space and resident complaints that force code enforcement when signs are placed in dangerous locations or are torn down or defaced. Non-commercial signs should be displayed on private property. Private citizens vote and are welcome to respectfully share their opinions.

Second, I urge approval of 24-350. The proposed privatization of the Huntington Beach library system has no clear justification and will harm our libraries while costing taxpayers more money. This decision should be brought to a vote by the citizens of Huntington Beach. The City Council does not take into account the voices of people who provide supplemental communication and/or attend council meetings. The so-called "press conference" certainly didn't improve our image. Gracey whined about how Mexicans are certainly smart enough to get a voter ID. Now to the two agenda items I'm most interested in.

Agenda Item 29 — Amending the Sign Code. The months leading up to the primary election were the very definition of visual blight. Candidates for the November election should never have been allowed to put up signs in January. I strongly urge you to pass Agenda Item 29 to update the sign code for non-commercial signs in the public right-of-way. Agenda Item 30 — Privatization of the Libraries. There's no good reason to rush into library privatization, or even an RFP for it. Have you actually done any research? Hundreds of people have written opposition letters that you seem to totally ignore. For a step this large, it makes sense to put it to a vote of the people. You received positive input from only 26% of registered HB voters, in a primary election with very low turnout, which is definitely not a majority. The wise, prudent, fair thing to do would be to put it to a vote in November, and get everyone's opinion. Four people should not be taking it upon themselves to make such a drastic change to our library, against all common sense and certainly not to save a little bit of money or to punish people who don't agree with you on censoring what we can read, or allow our children to read. If you think you're doing the right thing, you shouldn't be afraid to put it on the November ballot. The cowardly way would be to stubbornly push ahead, ram it through, damn the consequences. Which will you choose?

As a 30+ year resident of the City, consistent voter, regular HBPL patron, I urge you to vote unanimously to 1) stop the RFP process underway; and, 2) allow the City's residents decide whether to continue the current excellent management of the HBPL, or to privatize or outsource its management.

In mid- April, I attended the Community and Library Services Commission meeting at which the RFP for privatization or outsourcing was discussed. Why this topic was agendized AFTER the City Council had already voted on the RFP was a source of confusion to everyone. It was apparent that the Commission members did not understand what would or would not be included in the RFP. If you haven't already done so, you should read the Commission's minutes where you will see that most attendees were against the RFP process by a significant margin!

Last week, I spent several hours at the Central library asking patrons if they were aware of the possible "outsourcing" or "privatizing" of the library. Very few patrons were aware of this potential action by the City Council. When I explained that the staff could be replaced by employees of a private company, nearly all of the 25+ people I spoke with were against the idea and mentioned how pleased they were with the existing management of the library and the staff.

The City's residents have made it abundantly clear that they care deeply about the fate of the HBPL. The vast majority of the written communications and speakers have eloquently articulated their many wonderful experiences in the library and the continued value that it provides to the City and the surrounding community.

You should consider it an honor to uphold the value of the HBPL and not simply look at the library as a "cost center" of the City.

Do the right thing for the community and let the voters decide how the HBPL should be managed.

Council Members,

This push toward privatization represents a leadership failure unprecedented in our city's history. For over 114 years, our public library has stood as a beacon of knowledge and community. Despite financial challenges through the years, each city council, with the help of generous donations from non-profit groups, has managed to keep it afloat. However, the recent threats and proposals pushed by misguided individuals and their enablers are reprehensible. The inability of our city to safeguard this beloved institution is inexcusable. Our library should be celebrated, not treated as a disposable commodity for sale to the highest (or lowest) bidder.

Privatizing a library will never be an achievement, it will always be seen as the failure of local government that it is. The indifference to the quality of life of the citizenry that such a move represents will never be forgotten.

One might assume that some level of basic research was conducted before placing this disastrous privatization item on the agenda. If so, the City would know that our public library is already the most efficiently run in Orange County, providing an exceptional return on investment for our community—especially considering the lack of support both financially and from City itself. Astonishingly, taxpayers contribute only \$27 a year per capita for our remarkable Library, whereas the national average stands at \$70 per capita. Given these realities, it is perplexing that our City, in its purported wisdom, chooses to target our beloved, underfunded library as a cost-saving measure. Squeezing the life out of this cherished institution to save a buck is nothing short of disgraceful.

Let's examine the data: Our city library comprises less than 2% of the total city budget and has not received any budget increases over the past five years. In fact, since 2014, the budget has only experienced a marginal 2% increase. Given that the library operates on a modest five-million-dollar budget, this 2% increment amounts to a mere \$100,000. Meanwhile, the Friends of the Library contributes more than double that amount annually. A contribution that will end if privatization were to occur. Interestingly, LS&S contracts receive a 2.5% increase every year. It begs the question: Is our City willing to grant a private equity firm a 2.5% budget boost annually while neglecting similar generosity toward our publicly run City library?

It remains inexplicable why the City persists in pursuing privatization—a move that appears more like an embarrassing display of nihilism than a genuine cost-saving effort.

The notion being floated that privatization will magically solve our city's self-inflicted problems is nothing more than a fantasy. In reality, it exacerbates our existing issues. Those who believe that so called 'pornography and obscene materials' are exclusive to our public library will be surprised to discover that these same materials exist in privatized libraries as well. A quick search of online catalogs would confirm this fact. LS&S's flagship library in their vast portfolio of failures, Riverside County, shows so-called pornographic/obscene books such as *'Gender Queer'*, *'It's Perfectly Normal'* and the most offensive book ever published *'Everyone Poops'* available in the Children's and Young Adult portions of the library.

Another question arises: Do criminal accusations made against librarians suddenly cease when the library is privatized? If so, it leads one to wonder whether the attacks on our library and staff were truly about the books or are perhaps fueled by personal vendettas and retaliation for unknown personal grievances. Alongside these accusations, we have witnessed threats, unfair practices, a hostile work environment, violations of municipal and ethics codes and overreach by the Mayor further complicating matters. Even if the attacks and criminal accusations from the council dias come to an end, it remains unlikely that certain segments of the public will dismiss the assertions, presented as fact by some City Council members that libraries are peddling pornography to children and are full of groomers and pedophiles. Once such ideas have been released, they cannot be easily retracted. Meanwhile, a committee of hyper-partisan citizens—representing 0.00000105% of the population—scrutinizing thousands of children's books. Their mission? To decide who might be sexually aroused by innocent illustrations. These efforts, masquerading as public policy, are supposedly to protect other people's children from books they deem objectionable. This entire exercise is an absolute insult to our experienced, educated, professional librarians.

It is important that the workplace harassment endured by library staff, a situation created and enabled by the City, has been acknowledged by the Interim City Manager . I assume this information will be disclosed to any for-profit private equity firm planning to bid on this proposal. It is crucial for them to recognize that their librarians and staff will face the same unfettered, relentless attacks on their personal character, professionalism, and morality. Publicly labeling them as 'groomers' and 'pedophiles' by both members of the public and City Council should raise serious concerns for any company wishing to take over our library. One must wonder why any responsible company, having basic regard for its workforce, would willingly subject itself and its employees to such abuse and potential litigation.

Additionally, it is essential to note that this harassment extends beyond library staff. It affects volunteers, non-profit support groups, patrons, educators, other council members and anyone who dares to defend the library. These attacks persist due to the City's tolerance and enablement, full disclosure of this fact is also imperative.

Our public libraries, along with everyone in them deserve unwavering protection and support. Next year will be the 50th Anniversary of the Central Library, the iconic crown jewel of Huntington Beach. Volunteers like me should be planning a grand celebration, not a funeral. Fighting for our Library is always the right thing to do. Support Agenda Item 24-350.
