SUPPLEMENTAL COMMUNICATIONS PERTAINING TO PUBLIC HEARING ITEM #14 (26-279)

(Received After Agenda Distribution)

Pursuant to the Brown "Open Meetings" Act, Assistant City Clerk Juan Esquivel announced supplemental communications received by his office following distribution of the Council Agenda packet which were all uploaded to the City's website and Councilmember iPads: *(16 email communications, Ascon Landfill Site document, and Expert Environmental Opinion and Analysis Regarding Validity of the CEQA Notice of Exemption for the HBCSD Maintenance and Operations Building Project with Appendices A – D)*.

Jennifer Villaseñor, Director of Community Development, introduced Jason Kelly, Senior Planner, who presented a PowerPoint communication titled *Appeal of Planning Commission's Approval of CUP No. 23-014 (HBCSD Maintenance & Operations Building)*, with slides entitled: *Project Request; Project Site; Surrounding Uses; Planning Commission Action; Site Plan; Floor Plan; Front & Side Elevations; Rear Elevation; Appeal; Appeal Analysis (2); Summary; and Questions?*

Councilmember Burns and Director Villaseñor discussed potential alternative actions: 1) Council could not approve the Conditional Use Permit, or 2) continue the appeal with directions to staff. A denial of the Conditional Use Permit would have to be based on Council's inability to make findings for approval. If Council does not approve the Conditional Use Permit the project cannot move forward.

Councilmember Williams asked Director Villaseñor to describe the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) analysis delineating the responsibilities of the lead agency vs the responsible agency (City of Huntington Beach). Director Villaseñor replied that a responsible agency (the City) has discretionary approval over a project based on land use entitlement. The City can choose to approve the CEQA analysis which was performed by the lead agency or request their own CEQA analysis.

Councilmember Williams confirmed with Director Villaseñor that the school district is currently using this project parcel for administrative offices including their central kitchen and maintenance operations. Director Villaseñor confirmed that when the maintenance operations were moved to this location in 2018/19 the School District sought authorization from the Department of State Architects (DSA). The discussion continued regarding DSA's authority, and Director Villaseñor stated the City believes this project for a new building must meet zoning codes and is subject to a Conditional Use Permit (CUP) which is the purpose of this discussion. Councilmember Williams asked if the District has been performing maintenance operations without City approval since 2018/19.

Mayor Pro Tem Twining stated that from his observations it appears the school district is currently using three or four ocean-going containers to only store equipment and supplies for the maintenance crew at this subject property. To the best of his knowledge no actual repairs or maintenance operations take place at this site.

Councilmember Williams confirmed with City Attorney Mike Vigliotta that if the property use changed from a school to a maintenance yard it would require a Conditional Use Permit (CUP).

Councilmember Kennedy confirmed with Director Villasenor that the school district apparently received authorization from the Department of State Architects (DSA) to operate their administrative offices which include maintenance operations as previously described by Mayor Pro Tem Twining.

Councilmember Kennedy stated that when he and Mayor Pro Tem served on the Planning Commission, they were the force behind requiring a sound study and soil samples for this project. He asked if anyone on the City's side has confirmed that DSA has the autonomy or judicial right to give any approval.

Councilmember Williams and City Attorney Vigliotta revisited the authority of the Department of State Architects (DSA).

Councilmember Gruel confirmed with Director Villasenor the City reviews the CEQA environmental study and regulatory framework when evaluating if a project is eligible for an exemption. When an exemption is approved there must be findings to support the decision. In this case, the site is fully graded with an existing development and there are no environmental conditions that would rise to preclude the City from utilizing a categorical exemption.

Councilmember Gruel raised the fact of the proximity to the ASCON landfill, and Director Villasenor responded that one of the things the City has to consider is whether the project is on a hazardous site according to a specific list in government code.

Councilmember Williams and Director Villasenor discussed the proximity of the project to the Cannery Street waste landfill, which is the parcel directly south of the project's southern border as shown on the Project Site slide from the PowerPoint communication, and includes Edison Park.

Mayor McKeon opened the Public Hearing

Public Hearing Item #14 (26-279) Public Speakers (3-minute time limit) — 12 Speakers

Daniel Barbara, Pacific Rim Eco, Registered Environmental Professional with a Doctorate in Health Science and Board Certified in Public Health, representing Robert Granger and residents of Breton Lane, stated they are not trying to stop this project, but rather have concerns because this industrial scale maintenance yard is 22.5 feet from single family homes. They believe this bypasses one of the most fundamental safeguards of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA). Their expert opinion concludes the District's Notice of Exemption is factually and procedurally invalid. First, this project relies on an unauthorized baseline; the Notice Of Exemption was filed before a project decision or any permit requests were submitted; the district claims the Class III exemption for "small structures" such as offices or stores and noted this is not a store but an industrial facility housing services for powerful vehicles, storing and/or utilizing industrial solvents, pesticides and other controlled industrial chemicals in an extraordinarily sensitive environment; the site sits in a historic environment of hazards which already affect the health and quality of life for surrounding residents; the site is poorly drained, has a shallow water table, there are known large quantities of methane pockets; CEQA's unusual circumstances exception was written for this exact scenario; and the chronic environmental stress and physical health consequences of potential exposure to area residents, especially when the District has already demonstrated a lack of transparency by recently denying any access to conduct an independent visual view of the yard. Because Mr. Barbara is Certified, Councilmember Kennedy confirmed with Mr. Barbara that the DSA actually disclaimed the authority to make any decision with regards to this project in writing as a result of the fact the facility does not house children. (02:21:38)

Erika Vega, Senior Consultant, Pacific Rim Eco, addressed technical and health issues. She discussed the district's environmental claim this is a small structure with minimal impact; five foot water table issues; human health issues for families living 22.5 feet from industrial activity; the District has not conducted a noise study; District denied Pacific Rim access for a visual inspection of the site; lack of an initial study for safety to ensure proper mitigation measures; site is on top of an already contaminated historical industrial disposal site; and noted that the unusual circumstances at this proposed site should prevent the District's categorical exemption. The residents deserve an environment that is safe by design, not safe by a Notice of Exemption. She respectfully asked that Council follow the science, overturn the exemption, require a full and transparent environmental review. (02:22:18)

Heather Sorensen, living adjacent to the Kettler site for over 20 years, stated this is not an abstract policy debate but rather whether the neighborhood remains a safe place to live. She believes what is being proposed now is entirely different from historical school use and should be in an industrial area. It is about noise, safety, increased vehicular traffic through residential streets, and disturbing soils adjacent to a landfill. Back yards that were once peaceful will be backing up to an industrial work yard with fumes and waste. The neighbors bear the health, safety and overall living consequences, not the District. She added that if nothing changed, there would be no need for a new building, new studies, new approval or new Conditional Use Permit (CUP). She asked that Councilmembers protect the people who live in the neighborhood and not sacrifice a residential neighborhood for operational convenience. (02:25:02)

Lucy Granger, who grew up living right behind the proposed project site, stated her opposition to this project. She stated that rules exist for a reason and no one should be allowed to ignore them. She added that an industrial yard bringing in heavy machinery and hazardous material is not a "small structure" as claimed by the District. Just because the District wants to bypass environmental and City oversight to save money doesn't mean the adjoining neighborhood should become their collateral damage. She noted this project will interfere with an existing Edison Park walkway and create a dangerous corridor behind her house which will impact her safety and peace of mind. She asked Councilmembers to reject the District Notice of Exemption and legally demand the formal initial study they should have done years ago. (02:27:51)

Becky Granger, Huntington Beach resident for 33 years whose home is 22.5 feet from the District's proposed project, stated her opposition to this project. She asked that Council demand a proper environmental review because she believes the District has made many claims not backed by facts. She stated the District keeps saying this is about the kids. What about the kids and adults in her neighborhood who have been exposed to hazardous materials? What are the potential fire hazards from these chemicals? What about the dark corridor that will be created by a 7,500 sq. ft. building that is 17.5 feet high just 10 feet from the walkway? This corridor is used to access Edison Park, by kids getting to Edison High School, and families walking their dogs. Will it become a place for illicit activities? The neighborhood is trying to protect their homes, safety, health and well-being. As an individual with a compromised immune system, she is concerned the District CEQA consultant has not considered any environmental issues. She asked that Councilmembers require a full environmental report. (02:30:25)

Pete Minko, a long-time resident whose three children attended Kettler Elementary School, shared his opinions regarding the consequences for the neighborhood when the District sells off closed schools, especially at Edison Park: increased light pollution, noise with student sports, traffic, and increased trash.

When this project is considered, it will just increase noise, potential for chemical spills, as well as the negative visual impact. (02:33:39)

Evan Sorensen, with Kettler School in his backyard, addressed the City's conclusion that this project will not be detrimental to nearby residents and is merely a small low-impact facility. He stated this building is a new purpose-built maintenance operations facility for permanent storage, para functions, fleet activity and mechanical systems located directly next to family homes. This will change the intensity, permanence and character of use for the entire site. The District's CEQA Exemption is based on the belief this is a small building of 7,500 sq. ft. The neighborhood homes are all less than 2,000 sq. ft. This is not a negligible expansion but a permanent land-use change. Even where a categorical exemption is claimed, CEQA removes that exemption when unusual circumstances create a reasonable possibility of environmental impact. This project does not exist in isolation but is part of a broader District effort to centralize operations which includes a storage facility. CEQA requires evaluation of the whole project, not just dividing it up in pieces to avoid review. He added this Council must make an independent finding compatible with the neighborhood. Proximity, intensity, noise and permanence all matter. Tonight's decision is about whether the City is comfortable standing behind a legally vulnerable CEQA exemption. He respectfully requested that the City Council deny this project or at least require proper environmental review before any approval. (02:36:50)

Robert Granger, whose home backs up to the School District property, stated this project is a non-classroom facility, as categorized by State Code 53094. He asked Councilmembers not to make his neighborhood pay for the District's mismanagement. He noted this "little shed" is 7,500 sq. ft. compared to the 1,500 sq. ft. neighborhood homes. He added that this project does not fit with the use goals for LU2 that a new development preserves and enhances a distinct Surf City identity, culture and character in neighborhoods. He stated there is already a dark alley in his neighborhood and this project will just make that situation worse. He also shared his concern about how this project could impact his ability to obtain home insurance. (02:39:56)

Mark Manstorf, resident of Huntington Beach and HBCSD employee, expressed his appreciation for the many questions, discussions and site walks by Councilmembers to get a complete picture of M & O operations for the School District. He stated he was available to answer any questions as the discussions continued. (02:43:09)

Linda Minko, a Kettler Tract resident for 35 years, stated her opposition to this project. This is a residential neighborhood, not an industrial site, and this project will affect home values. This neighborhood has already dealt with ASCON, the power plant, and the desal plant. A maintenance facility will further ruin the neighborhood. Additionally, the School District should not get any special treatment. The fact that they started without proper permission is an indication this project shouldn't proceed. The proposed building will create a blind spot on the walkway to the park, a place where no one can see what is going on, creating a big safety issue. The building will become an eyesore for the residents who once saw blue sky from their backyards. Let the District find an industrial site for their industrial needs. She asked that Councilmembers represent the residents and vote against this project. (02:43:48)

Dana DeVore stated she is speaking to challenge the Notice of Exemption for the Maintenance and Operations building. She noted that the District has already built the site up by approximately four feet which makes neighboring properties two feet lower; therefore, the new 18 ft. building effectively becomes 22 ft. for homes 22 ft. from the property line. The combination of height, elevation and proximity is unusual and creates the possibility of significant impact. Specifically, loss of light, reduced air circulation, and over-bearing mass on neighboring properties. These considerations trigger CEQA's unusual

circumstances exception, which defeats the exception. The grade differential changes the natural drainage patterns and pushes runoff to the lower-lying residential properties. This increases ponding and localized flooding during storm events. These real site-specific impacts cannot be dismissed by categorical exemption. For these reasons the Notice of Exemption is invalid and a proper CEQA review is required. She also noted the District presentation shows areas for wood and metal working, not just storage of supplies. (02:45:17)

Brian Thienes, Huntington Beach Planning Commissioner, Civil Engineering and Land Survey Company owner, and someone who has worked with the DSA quite a bit, confirmed this is exempt from the Division of State Architect. "When authorizing construction of exempt projects, the School District assumes responsibility to ensure compliance with applicable code provisions." He added the Planning Commission could find no reason to deny the project. He believes the School District is trying to be good neighbors by asking the City to confirm they are complying with codes. He noted that the Design Review Committee recommended an additional 20-foot set-back to help buffer the neighbors. (02:47:38)

There being no more speakers, Mayor McKeon closed the Public Hearing for Item #14 (26-279).

The discussion continued with Councilmembers, City and District staff for over 1 ½ hours and included the following topics: is the school ground less polluted than the surrounding area because of all of the asphalt; has there been any comparison of pollutant readings between the Kettler and Edison Park locations; there is no evidence the landfill was on the school site; if the project is approved by City Council, code will require a geotechnical report which includes physical ground borings by the project engineer to determine remediation considerations; when that study was completed for Edison Park it was noted there could be settlement potential because of the landfill materials; the City's current specifications require testing for soil contamination and methane, and because this site is in a known methane district, methane remediation will be required; no permits for grading or building will be issued until that study is completed and a remediation action plan is identified.

Fire Department staff confirmed safety considerations for potential soil contaminants and methane before building permits would be issued by the City; would it be appropriate to require the environmental studies before approving the Conditional Use Permit (CUP); the presence of a landfill does not automatically mean that an Environmental Impact Report (EIR) is required; an EIR is required when there is potential for significant environmental effects to be caused by a project based on substantial evidence; it is already known, from the construction of Edison Park when the groundwater was tested, that there are high salinity levels and no evidence of a significant threat to groundwater because of the landfill materials; off-gassing is another consideration and it is already known that there is a methane control system for Edison Park as well as at Kettler; the potential for land settlement will be addressed through the geotechnical report and engineer recommendations; whether this project presents unusual circumstances considering that Huntington Beach has large areas which are part of a methane district making methane mitigation more common than not for development proposals; poorly draining soils and high-water tables are also very common throughout Huntington Beach; reference to *L. A. Times* articles, dated February 5, 2004, and in 2009, regarding methane found in the ground at Kettler Elementary School; noted that methane is not toxic, however it is flammable; further geotechnical analysis and testing will be required to determine if the soil is sturdy enough for a prefabricated building and testing for contaminants and methane will include systems to mitigate for the environmental concerns.

The discussion continued by noting that every project's geotechnical engineer must design a drainage system that prevents storm water from running off into the neighbors or public system; the grading plan must include drainage inlet and an underground detention basin; the grading and building permits will not be issued if this is not included and signed off by the City per code; research shows the landfill dump has

been there since 1957, extends through Edison Park, the Community Center and Kettler; methane gas probes are installed throughout Edison Park and one is on the Kettler site, on the opposite side of where the O & M project is planned; the State has determined that the Kettler site is not considered unsafe for occupancy; the water table for most of the City is at five feet or less; under their exemption section the DSA allows for some maintenance work and small alteration projects will be exempt from DSA review but the District must still meet Title 24 California Code Regulations.

There was a brief review of the 1990 Santa Ana Regional Water Quality Control Board required study as part of determining whether the landfill was material to causing an environmental threat to the groundwater. The report said the landfill materials were not causing an environmental threat, and there was high salinity due to saltwater intrusion. They then required monitoring for a number of years until it was determined there was no hazardous threat to safe groundwater and monitoring was stopped.

The discussion continued with defining CEQA categorical exceptions which the City must consider to determine if any exceptions occur; none of the CEQA exemptions were met when evaluating this project, therefore the categorical exemption applies; while staff advises the Councilmembers, the Councilmembers have the final discretion for determining the interpretation; reading of the exemption; HBCSD maintenance operation activities usually take place in the parking lot of the school requiring the maintenance; the proposed O & M site is primarily used for storage of material that is currently housed in storage containers that have been approved by the Huntington Beach Fire Department (HBFD) during multiple inspections; the District has never been cited by HBFD for storing hazardous materials; the discussion continued on the "Mechanic Bay" as shown on the project Floor Plan, and hazardous materials usually associated with mechanical work; the District's school buses are stored and maintained at another school district site; and there is no "mechanic" job description at HBCSD.

It was confirmed that some of the School District's paint is stored at the proposed O & M site, and items like paint, carpet and ceiling tiles are stored throughout the District at various storage sites to allow staff to remediate some issues; the proposed CUP allows the City to have control over the process through regular Fire and Police inspections; Fire Department staff re-confirmed that the project site is inspected annually, and noted the Fire Code describes the thresholds for hazardous materials; the six exceptions to the CEQA exemption were revisited; Fire Department staff confirmed that methane is not safe to breathe at higher concentrations; is there is a compromise to address potential methane build-up and its release into the neighboring properties; it appears that people do not want this project at Sowers School, but it is OK to put the potential for breathing chemicals in the Kettler neighborhood; a re-visit of the 2004 shut-down of Kettler School due to methane build-up; the District's CEQA analyst did consider the underlying landfill and methane gas when seeking their exemption; reiterated that further environmental review will be required by the City before any permit is issued; if any environmental issues are uncovered then remediation must be included in the plans before any permit is issued; Fire Department staff confirmed the project plans must comply with City specifications generally related to petrochemical or oil well contaminants and outside consultants/agencies are used if any issues are outside of the City's purview are uncovered; discussion continued regarding EIR considerations; timing considerations for truck access; and CUP requirement to abide by City noise level codes.

District CEQA Consultant reviewed CEQA requirements and consideration of landfill locations within a 2.5-mile range of the project site; the District has not done any methane testing as that process is required after the CUP is approved as part of meeting the City's code requirements for grading and building permits.

School District Counsel proceeded to describe some legal cases regarding "unusual circumstances" recognized in case law.

District staff noted that approval of the CUP will allow the District to proceed with the CEQA testing.

Discussion continued on whether it is safe to build at this site; if the CUP is approved the District can proceed with meeting the City's required processes and policies to ensure it is safe for the neighborhood to build at this site; staff believes it is safe to build at this site because of the stipulated conditions of approval imposed by the Planning Commission to ensure any environmental concerns would be remediated prior to issuance of grading and building permits; what authority the DSA has related to District operations at this project site; some of the concessions the District has made to date to address neighborhood concerns and issues related to the height of the proposed building; District believes the City code requires measuring height from the street curb; the School District has agreed to everything the City has required to this point in time; the Police Department is satisfied the proposed project will not increase public safety issues; over the last two years the District has worked to address resident concerns; the types of activities that are expected to take place inside of the proposed building and the sound study models; options considered for building placement on the project site based on results of the sound study; District lease considerations; District procedures going forward will not proceed very quickly after the CUP is approved; many other location options throughout the City were considered by the District; and building height and impact on residents whose back yards face the site.

Mayor McKeon stated he believes the District has already looked at alternative options; noted it has been over 600 days since the Planning Commission appeal and concessions made to address neighborhood concerns; acknowledged the annual Fire Department inspections for hazardous materials; and environmental concerns will be quantified, including mitigation measures, during the construction plan process before the City issues any permits.

Environmental Scientist Daniel Barbara asked why the safety valve, the CEQA process, has been bypassed in the last 600+ days, because the purpose of CEQA is to ensure protections are in place. Mayor McKeon reiterated that before the District can secure grading or building permits, they will be required to do soil composition testing and if contaminants are found, then their construction plans must also include remediation.

A substitute motion was made by Williams, second Gruel to CONTINUE this item with the condition to strike the CEQA categorical exemption and require additional CEQA analysis addressing methane migration, landfill gas migration, hazardous material inventory, and drainage.
