COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

The "Meet. Greet. Seek." initiative guides this ad hoc, which promotes volunteerism, observation, interaction and engagement opportunities within the community and HBPD major events.



CULTURAL CINEMA SHOWCASE

Featuring Q&A panels and independent short films highlighting underrepresented groups and celebrating a variety of cultures, including the "One HB Culture" of surf, skate, and eco conservation.



DAY OF DIALOGUE

A one-day retreat in partnership with Huntington Beach Union High School District and Orange County Human Relations to bring students together to discuss specific issues pertaining to their youth experiences and peers.



HB LISTENS

HB Listens hosts the Community Summit annually promoting engagement with community members through panelists, stories, and meaningful dialogue circles about a variety of topics that helps us get to know one another and honor our experiences.



THE RALPH BAUER YOUTH VOICES ESSAY & ART CONTEST

Renamed in honor of our founder, the late Dr. Ralph Bauer, this is an essay and art contest open to all Huntington Beach students, youth residents and high schools in the HBUHSD. Essays, art, and dance submissions are received and adjudicated by a team of professionals.







Special Guest: Chief Eric Parra (January 2022)

This year we welcomed new HBPD Police Chief, Eric Parra to attend a meeting to engage in open dialogue with him as he provided us with details on the HBPD's community relations and 2022 goals. Chief Parra has over 33 years of law enforcement experience, previously serving as the Chief of Police for the City of Alhambra. He has also held a variety of leadership roles with the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department.

Special Guest: Commissioner Kandee Lewis (February 2022)

At our February meeting we were joined by Civil + Human Rights and Equity Department Commissioner Kandee Lewis. Commissioner Lewis is the CEO/President of Positive Results Center (PRC). Through partnerships with law enforcement, judicial, government, and faith-based organizations, PRC provides training to help entities develop a culture of inclusion, social justice, and equity.

Cultural Cinema Showcase: Black History Month Cycle (March 2022)

Delayed due to COVID, we were honored to screen *\$TACK\$* starring (*to the left*) Daytime Emmy-nominated actor, Mark Christopher Lawrence (*Christmas with the Kranks, The Pursuit of Happyness*) directed by Gerald Webb (*Sharknado, Barry*), with a panel moderated by Kira Talise (*Insecure, Killing It*). 
HBHRC 25th Anniversary (April 2022)

CommUNITY Picnic (August 2022)



Community Summit (November 2022)


We hosted our Annual Community Summit Virtually. The two-night event explored the First Amendment and Free Speech on Night One followed by Building Community and Finding Common Ground on Night Two. Community members submitted personal accounts of their experiences living in Huntington Beach and those stories were shared during the event. A moderator and team of panelists guided the candid conversations.

Special Guest: Deputy DA Billy Ha (November 2022)

With special thank you to Member Stuart, Esq. and the District Attorney's Office, we welcomed Deputy District Attorney, Billy Ha, to our November meeting. Deputy DA Ha's presentation on the difference between a hate crime and a hate incident was enlightening and helped members better understand why some incidents are declared crimes and why some crimes may or may not be prosecuted.

Report on Hate Crimes and Hate Incidents (November 2022)

- On April 5, 2021, the City Council directed the HBHRC to work with the Huntington Beach Police Department (HBPD) and City staff to publish quarterly data summaries of reported hate crimes and hate incidents on the City website and submit recommendations to address these issues based on community stakeholder input.
- The HBHRC formed an ad-hoc committee to work on this Council directive. After 16 months of meeting, conducting research and hosting a community stakeholders meeting, the report was completed.
- On November 15, 2022, the report and recommendations were received and unanimously approved by the Huntington Beach City Council!
