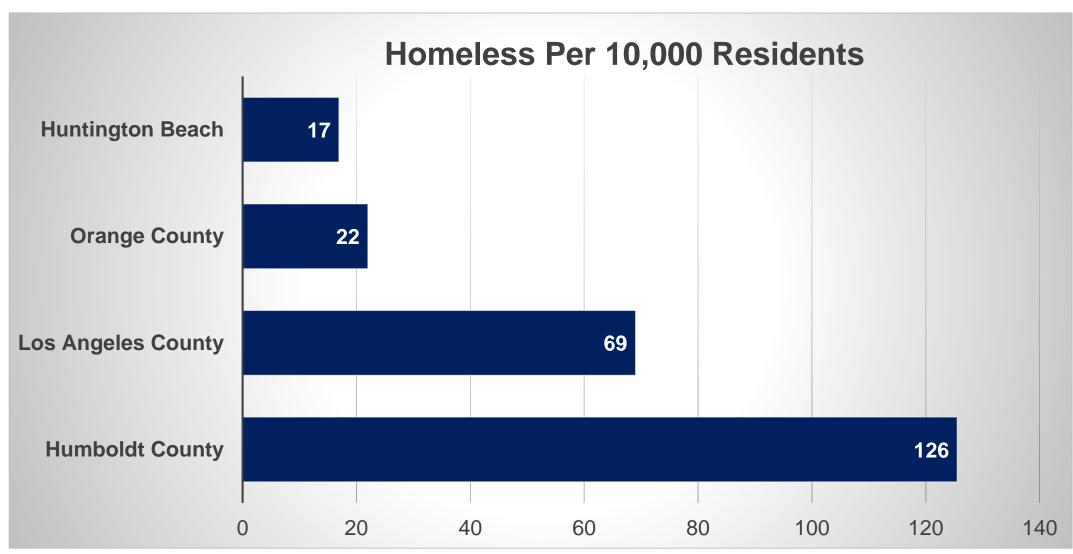

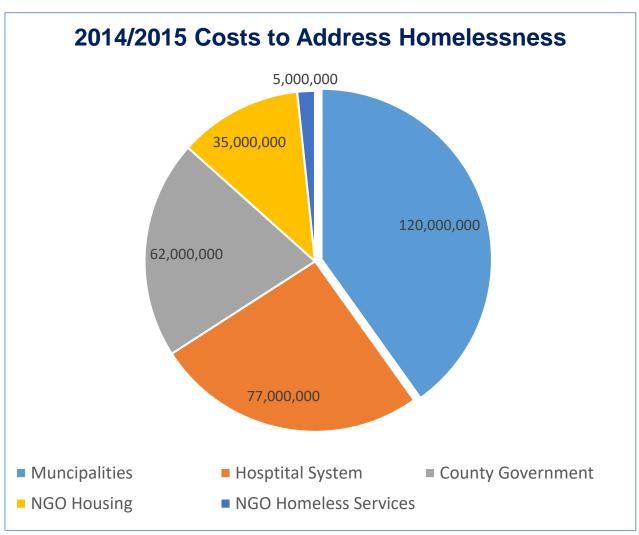

Over a 12-month period from 2014/2015, it was estimated \$299 million was spent to address homelessness in Orange County, including:

- \$23 million of these costs were related to criminal justice contacts
- \$121 million was spent providing healthcare
- The estimated average cost was \$45,000 per person experiencing homelessness per year.

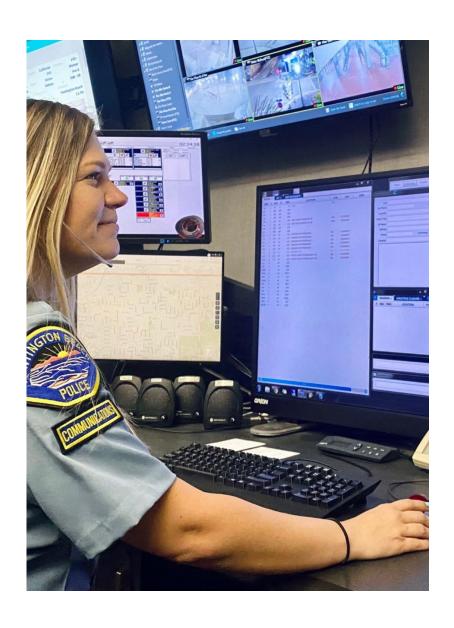

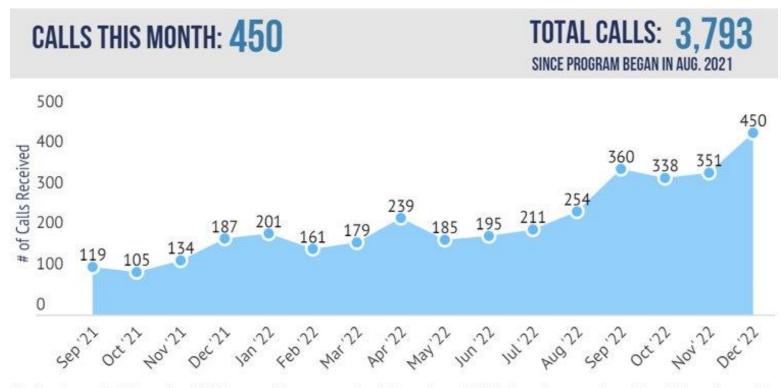

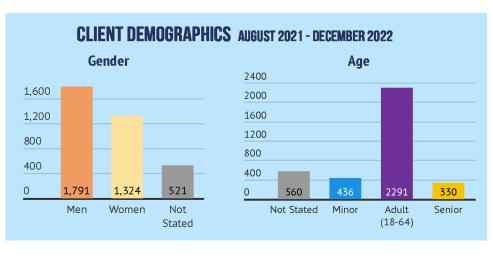

During the month of December, 65 follow-up calls were completed. Approximately 15% of our clients receive and benefit from these calls from our Be Well Team, which helps ensure they receive additional support and referrals needed to achieve improved health outcomes



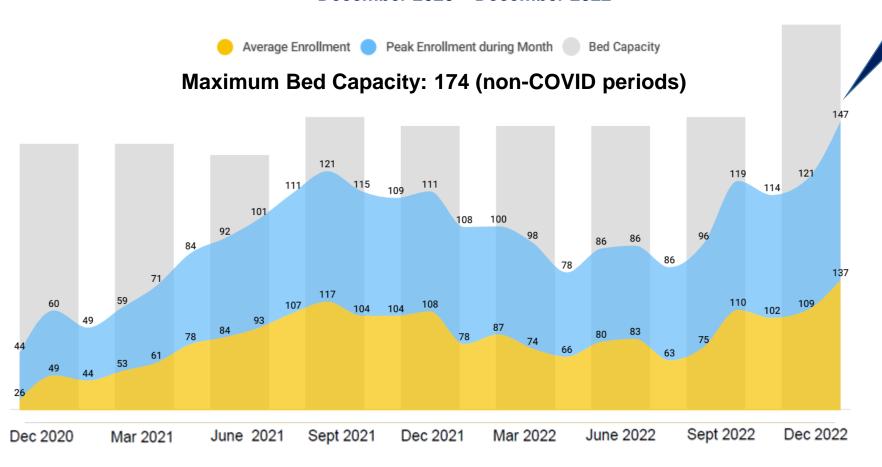

December 2020 - December 2022

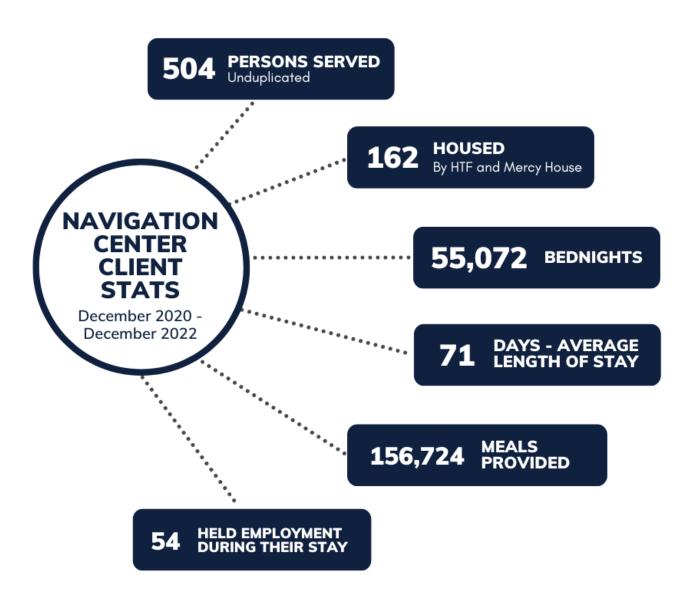

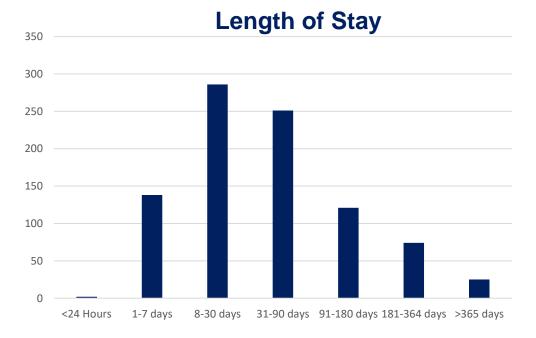

- Redevelopment of the Quality Inn into 62 Interim Housing units that will be converted into Permanent Supportive Housing in the future.
- Site is operated by an experienced non-profit, American Family Housing with 24/7 security and two support staff living onsite. This project is not a walk-up shelter and all placement is done through the County's Coordinated Entry System.
- Upon opening, 16 rooms (26%) were occupied by individuals from Huntington Beach.
- City committed \$2.4M in restricted funds (Low-Moderate Income Housing Asset Funds) towards construction and \$1.81M in HOME-ARP funds for fifth year supportive services, if needed.
