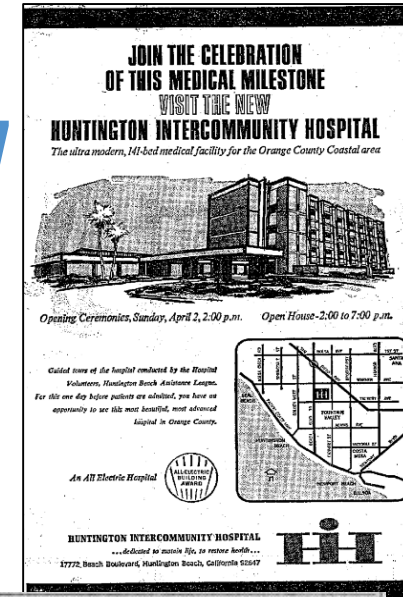

New Hospital All Electric

Significant economies in construction costs for the Huntington Intercommunity Hospital were effected by utilizing the all electric concept . . . claims Ralph C. Kiser, Southern California Edison Company district manager.

The medical facility which opens to the public at 2 p.m. Sunday and patients Monday . . . is the first all electric hospital to be constructed in the Edison 65,000 square mile service territory in central and southern California and central Nevada.

A unique heat transfer system was developed to salvage waste heat from the air conditioning system and use it for pre heating of hot water and heating the hospital.

The waste heat keeps water in the hot water storage tank from 105° to 120° F. Small electric booster heaters strategically located throughout the hospital raise the temperature of the water to operating use.

The four story, 80,000 square foot hospital utilizes the all electric concept which eliminates space usually devoted to heating equipment. No flue nor chimney's were

required and there was a significant reduction of ventilation air requirements for boiler rooms and machinery.

Using flameless electricity for the sole energy source also will contribute to the comfort of patients.

Each room has an individual thermostat so that the temperature can be raised or lowered for personalized comfort.

Huntington Intercommunity Hospital features a clean all electric kitchen with a capacity for preparing 15,000 meals per month.

340B Drug Pricing Program

Health Resources & Services Administration Program

Public Health Services Act 42 USC 256b, § 340b

Purpose of 340B

Permits eligible safety net providers “to stretch scarce Federal Resources as far as possible, reaching more eligible patients and providing more comprehensive services.”

H.R. Rep. No. 102-384(II), at 12 (1992)

Overview and Benefits

- Provides discounts on outpatient drugs to certain safety-net covered entities
- Participating covered entities report savings that range between 25-50% of Average Wholesale Price (AWP) for covered outpatient drugs as a result of 340B discounts
- **Savings may be used to:**
 - Reduce price of pharmaceuticals for patients
 - Provide services to more patients

What is needed from the Huntington Beach ?

- No Cost Memorandum of Understanding between the City of Huntington Beach and Huntington Beach Hospital, a not-for-profit Disproportionate Share Hospital.
- HRSA requires a local government official to certify that the facility is providing needed service to the indigent, uninsured or underinsured population in Huntington Beach and Orange County.

Commitment of Huntington Beach Hospital

- To continue the provision of health care services to the indigent, uninsured, or underinsured population in Huntington Beach and Orange County.
- This commitment totaled \$2,418,418 in FY 2017.
- Huntington Beach Hospital agrees to submit to the City of Huntington Beach relevant sections of the annual Medicare Cost report after audit.
